# **Good Neighbors**

Since our last newsletter, we have been trying to get to know the Baxter State Park neighborhood better. What happens along the Park boundary is important to preserving the Park's wilderness values.

At our Annual Meeting this April, we learned from Bart DeWolf more details about the management of T5R8, the land owned by Roxanne Quimby on the east side of the Park. Proposed management of T5R8 is good news for the Park; that was no surprise, but it was reassuring.

We also learned about management of the state-owned Telos Unit of the Bureau of Parks and Lands from Director Dave Soucy. He provided a valuable history lesson about


# **State House Event Big Success**

More than sixty people gathered on May 31 in the Hall of Flags at the Maine State House to celebrate the publication of a major research achievement by Friends of Baxter State Park. Charlie Jacobi, president of FOBSP, presented the first edition of the four-volume Percival P. Baxter's Vision for Baxter State Park: An Annotated Compilation of Original Sources to Governor John

Baldacci, who accepted the gift on behalf of the State of Maine.

On hand also to receive first copies were Attorney General Steven Rowe, chair of the Baxter State Park Authority, Park Director Irvin "Buzz" Caverly, and representatives of selected libraries across the state.

The hardbound collection will now be available for public use and scholarship. It brings together a vast array of original

sources and personal notes that convey Governor Baxter's intent and vision for the Park, including the Deeds of Trust, legislative interpretations, Opinions of the Attorneys General, appellate court decisions, and the many Baxter speeches and correspondence.

The project coordinator and annotator is Dr. Howard Whitcomb, Emeritus Professor of Political Science, Lehigh University, who spent three years compiling this work.

"It was a great day," said John Neff, Board member who spearheaded the event, as guests gathered at the luncheon that followed. "Publication of this book has been a long-held dream and goal for our organization."

state lands, and we learned that a revised management plan for the Telos Unit is on the horizon. This will be an opportunity for the Friends to provide some input to encourage management of this unit with the wilderness values of the Park in mind. Motorized use of Webster Lake, including aircraft, will be on our agenda for this plan.

On June 3, we combined a field trip to the Park with Director Caverly and a flight around the Park boundary for several board members. On the field trip, we got a first-hand look at proposed changes to Nesowadnehunk Campground and environs (see the article in this issue) and expect to offer comments and suggestions soon to assist in the planning process.

On the flight, Ken Spalding, Bill Bentley, and I flew around the Park boundary with the intent of seeing the neighborhood first hand from the air, especially the East Branch Lands. What did we learn? We can report that there has been heavy timber cutting on the East Branch Lands north and south of Katahdin Lake and many roads extending their tentacles close to the Park boundary. (See photo on page 1.) Roads and cutting extend very close to the Park boundary on the west as well. All these roads provide access to the Park for poaching of fish and wildlife and other illegal activities that are difficult to control and patrol.

Management Area in the north part of the Park looks very different from what you see on the east and west sides. Roads and cutting are much less evident in the SFMA, a testament to different forest management based on Governor Baxter's wishes and directed by Jensen Bissell.

The harvesting north of Katahdin Lake on the East Branch Lands is tragic because it includes late succession forest stands (possibly old growth) where no cutting has occurred since 1918. Governor Baxter's vision for the Park included these lands, and of course recently there has been talk of adding them to the Park. It would be a shame if all the old trees were gone when this happened.

The Friends has not been involved in any of the East Branch Lands negotiations, but we have urged their acquisition and will continue to do so. If these lands are offered up to become part of the Park, we will advocate strongly for their inclusion as wilderness, as part of the so-called Sanctuary of the Park. There was no Friends group when the West Branch Lands became a multi-use part of the Park with hunting allowed. That made little sense given that Governor Baxter's goal was a wilderness park, his feelings about wildlife were well known, and there was a natural river boundary in the

West Branch. Maybe we can make a difference with the East Branch Lands. We're good neighbors, too, even if we live all around the state and beyond.

This year, in addition to the

For three-year terms, we welcome Steve Cartwright of Waldoboro, a Maine journalist for 32 years, who has been a lobbyist for NRCM, run for the legislature, and served as a selectman. Anne Huntington of Wayne has degrees in special education and law and presently coordinates the Local and Natural History Program at Wayne Elementary School, is president of the Androscoggin Lake Improvement Corporation, and serves on various local boards. Kali Lightfoot of Portland is Executive Director of the National Resource Center for Osher Lifelong Learning. She was on the executive staff of Elderhostel for 25 years. John Loyd of Harpswell, who returns to a full term after joining us in midstream, is an attorney and has served on the

Baxter State Park Advisory Committee for 15 years and continues to serve on its Finance and Reservations Committees. Howard Whitcomb is Emeritus Professor of Political Science at Lehigh University. He has spent three years compiling and annotating Baxter source materials pertaining to the legal foundations of Baxter State Park management. And filling the vacated term for the remaining two years is Rex Turner of Augusta, who is Lake Science Educator for Maine Lakes Conservancy Institute and a practicing Maine Guide and has degrees in Recreation and Park Management and in Forestry.

Your board works hard on behalf of the Park and the Friends (and, we hope, smartly). But there are also many opportunities for members to participate in committees and activities of the Friends. If you have an interest, please contact us.

# Where We Stand Friends of Baxter State Park Policies

The following report was presented to the membership at the Friends' Annual Meeting in April. Please see the website for more details.

- We urged the re-opening of the North Peaks Trail because it offers an alternative to the heavy use around Katahdin and an important link to Russell Pond, because concerns about International Appalachian Trail use can be mitigated, and because we believe the maintenance burden is manageable.
- We supported the removal of the Outlet and Lookout Cabins on Daicey Pond because we felt it was consistent with Governor Baxter's vision and because shorelines are environmentally and experientially sensitive areas.
- We supported the management of visitor-wildlife conflicts at Sandy Stream and Stump Ponds to protect wildlife, reduce visitor impacts to soil and vegetation, and ensure outstanding wildlife experiences for visitors.
- 4. We supported the limitation of opening day reservations to 20% of the sites for any campground because it is more equitable and efficient.
- We supported the evaluation and continued monitoring of commercial use in the Park to ensure wilderness values are not compromised and to ensure an appropriate balance of commercial and noncommercial use.
- We supported the Park's commitment to use a formal planning framework and its efforts to hire a planner to address the complex issues surrounding day use around Katahdin.
- We urged that a suitable buffer be used on a timber cut in the SFMA bordering the Tote Road to protect wilderness experiences and avoid visitor misunderstandings.
- We wholeheartedly supported the conservation of the East Branch Lands in public ownership to better "preserve, support and enhance" the Park's wilderness values.
- We are actively working other issues: Maine Woods National Park, snowmobiles, a Long Range Park Plan we feel is much needed, and the proposed realignments in Nesowadnehunk Campground.

- We offered our help in reducing the administrative use of snowmobiles for logistical support in Park operations.

### Changes Coming to Nesowadnehunk Stream Campground

Concerns about erosion of the steep bank leading down to the stream and deteriorating cribwork at some sites, safety issues from windthrown trees (large fall of trees two winters past), and deterioration of the bridge over the stream have led Baxter State Park managers to outline some major changes for Nesowadnehunk Stream Campground.

The current group camping area will become the main family camping area with all lean-tos. A few walk-in tent sites will remain on the west side of the stream, relocated mostly to areas vacated by the ranger camp, crew camp, wood shed and shop.

The bridge will become foot traffic only for these few walkin sites west of the stream.

A new crew camp/winter bunkhouse has already been built between the picnic area and the stream. The ranger camp will be moved across the stream to be near the new crew camp. All administrative facilities will be clustered in this area.

The East Field near Little
Nesowadnehunk Stream will be
converted from family camping
lean-tos to a group site. A new
three-site group camping area
will be created across the road
and just north of the main field
in a satellite field screened by

alders and other vegetation.

Three tent sites will remain north of the new group area in the East Field, and two lean-tos built at the northeastern edge of the main field.

All work will be phased in over four years, ending in 2007. In the near future, the Friends Policy Committee will be offering comments to the Park to help fine tune the plan.
