Snowmobiles have been using the Perimeter (Tote) Road along the west side of the Park for several years with most of the users following Park rules. But there are enough violations to cause the Park to revisit this contentious subject.

Excessive speed. Violations of Park closure rules. Littering. Vandalism. These were all problems reported by Chief Ranger Chris Drew at a meeting of a newly formed Snowmobile Subcommittee held this fall at Park Headquarters.

The Subcommittee, made up of snowmobile users, skiers, and other interested members of the public, was formed to assist Park staff in managing snowmobile use.


The Park does not know the extent of snowmobile use since few register at the gates. Despite obvious heavy use of the Tote Road, especially early in the season and on weekends, only 20 snowmobilers bothered to stop and register during the 2003-4 season.

Snowmobiles have long been a controversial issue at the Park. In the 1960's, they were allowed

but were restricted to the Tote Road and a few other trails in the 1970's. In 1976, they were banned except for administrative and emergency use; but in 1981, under a new Authority, they were allowed again on the Tote Road by a 2-1 vote. Since that time, the Park has not allowed any trail grooming; and although the machines are subject to a 20 m.p.h. speed limit, that rule is rarely enforced.

At the Subcommittee meeting, Park staff suggested ways to monitor snowmobile use by manning the gates or by electronic counts. Suggestions by others included: stepped up enforcement by the Warden Service, increased fines for violations, and better education of users through the rental outfitters and the Maine Snowmobile Association.

Friends will continue to monitor this issue.

Attendance Drops Over 20% in Ten Years; Some of the Pressures on Park Are Eased

Is Baxter State Park becoming so popular—and crowded—that it soon may be loved to death?

The answer appears to be a resounding No.

That is what attendance figures indicate over the past 10 years—an average 20%-plus decline in the number of visitors since 1995.

The Park staff is still trying to pin down the causes, but the general feeling seems to be that the decline is a positive rather than a negative factor. By the mid-'90's traffic on the narrow roads, full parking lots, and heavy use of mountain trails were becoming increasingly worrisome to Park managers.

But these problems may have been self-controlling because from 1995 to the present, there has been a

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downward trend in the number of visitors, camper nights, and visitor days (the three main statistical indices). There was one brief break in this trend in 1998-99 when all three rose a bit, but this was followed by a steady drop, particularly steep in 2003 and 2004.

"There may be several causes," says Park Director Buzz Caverly, "such as crowding on the mountain, long waiting lines at the entrance gates, and the early planning process needed to be assured of reservations at the choice times of the year. And then, there is always the weather." Weeks of rain or very hot spells can lead to cancellations of camping plans and sharp drops in one-day visits.

Whether or not the decline is short or long term remains to be seen. "We don't want to over react," says Caverly. "We still need to monitor the trends."

Does this easing of attendance pressures affect his proposals to make the Park "wilder within?" "Not a bit," says the Director. "My thinking is for long-term protection, and I will continue to proceed with enthusiasm." He does see the wilder-within subject still at the discussion stage, and he welcomes continued comment from the public.

Major Friends Project to Archive All Baxter Materials Nearly Done

The Friends of BSP has recently undertaken an ambitious research project to identify, annotate, and make readily accessible all the source material pertinent to understanding Gov. Baxter's vision and intent for Baxter State Park and the wilderness values being protected there.

An Emeritus Professor of Political Science, Howard R. Whitcomb has been at work compiling the collection. The four-volume, nearly 1400-page collection will include the Deeds of Trust, appellate court decisions, Attorney General opinions, and the relevant correspondence and speeches of Governor Baxter.

There has been excellent cooperation by the Office of the Attorney General, Baxter State Park, the Maine State Library, and the State Law Library. The 12 hard-bound copies of the collection will soon be provided without cost to a number of key offices and libraries throughout the state.

These materials should prove invaluable to those who wish to weigh in on the issues facing the Park and to researchers who need to examine original source materials regarding Baxter's vision for the Park. A small grant from the Davis Foundation has helped to make this project possible, and contributions from our members to help further defray the costs will be most appreciated.

Easy on the Moose!

Over the past year, the Park has implemented our ideas for Sandy Stream Pond, including signage, patrols, and restricting numbers to Moose Pass holders once parking lots close for the whole day.

Additional work was done to record and map the habitual use by both humans and moose at Stump and Dwelley ponds.

skills to work for the towns of Hope


and Rockport.
